Important Notices

New York State's Plastic Bag Ban started on Sunday, March 1

[There will be a one-month grace period for stores that need to use up their inventory.] Stores will also be charging a 5-cent fee for paper bags in New York City and a few other counties across the state. The ban and fee only affects the bags that you get when you are checking out at a store. It does not impact bags you might buy in the store, like garbage bags or Ziplock bags. It also does not affect in-store bags such as those used to hold raw meat or produce. Plastic bags used by restaurants for take-out or delivery are also exempt from the ban...**If you need reusable bags**, State Senator Liz Krueger's office is distributing free reusable bags made of 90% recycled material that fold into a built-in pouch with a carabiner clip. Call 212-490-9535 or email liz@lizkrueger.com to request bags. Please indicate how many free bags you would like, up to a maximum of five.

MAIL REGISTRATION Application must be postmarked no later than **April 3, 2020** and received by a board of elections no later than April 8, 2020 to be eligible to vote in the Primary.

IN PERSON REGISTRATION You may register at your local board of elections or any state agency participating in the National Voter Registration Act, on any business day throughout the year but, to be eligible to vote in the State and Local Primary, your application must be received no later than **April 3, 2020**.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS Notices of change of address from registered voters received by **April 8, 2020** by a county board of elections must be processed and entered in the records in time for the Primary.

March 12-20: Initial invitations to respond online and by phone will be delivered by the U.S. Postal Service. Areas that are less likely to respond online will receive a paper questionnaire along with the invitation to respond online or over the phone.

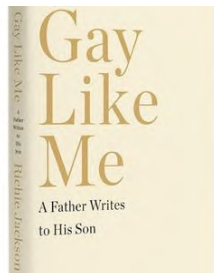
March 16-24: Reminder letters will be delivered.

March 26-April 3: Reminder postcards will be delivered to households that have not responded.

April 1 is Census Day, a key reference date for the 2020 Census. When completing the census, you will include everyone living in your home on April 1, 2020. Census Day will be celebrated with events across the country.

April 8-16: Reminder letters and paper questionnaires will be delivered to remaining households that have not responded.

April 20-27: Final reminder postcards will be delivered to households that have not



yet responded before census takers follow up in person.

May 13-July 31: If a household does not respond to any of the invitations, a census taker will follow up in person.

December 2020: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.

by March 2021: The Census Bureau will send redistricting counts to states. This information is used to redraw legislative districts based on population changes. There are 3 ways to respond to the Census: online, by phone, by mail. Census workers will visit homes that have not responded.

Metropolitan Synagogue Celebrates its 60th Anniversary & Cantor Michael Niemann Celebration Concert



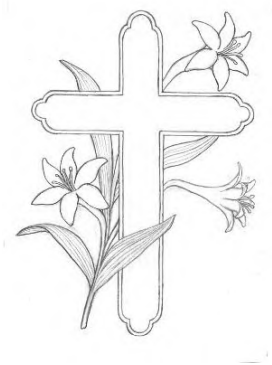
